- Christians worship in churches through prayer, singing and services led by a priest, Minister or Vicar., reading from The Bible (Sacred Text)
- Muslims worship in a Mosque, read from The Koran (sacred Text) and believe in Mohammed
- Jews worship in a synagogue with services led by a rabbi reading from The Torah.
- Hindus worship in a temple led by a Mandir, reading from The Vedas (Scared Text) and believe in Brahman who is One God with many qualities displayed in hundreds of Murtis (gods)
- Sikhs worship in a Gurdwara led by any Sikh, reading from The Guru Granth Sahib (Sacred Text)



When people talk about "the gospel," there's only one thing they mean: the life and ministry of Jesus Christ. Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John are the four books of the Bible that record almost everything we know about Jesus. If we want to learn about the things Jesus said and did, we have to turn to these ancient texts, believed to have been written by eyewitnesses or people who spoke with them during the first century. They are stories told in such a way as to evoke a certain image of Jesus for a particular audience.

Holy Week

In Christianity, Holy Week is the week leading up to Easter Sunday. The week begins on Palm Sunday and includes the events of The Last Supper, Jesus' arrest in Gethsemane, Jesus' crucifixion on Good Friday and his resurrection on Easter Sunday.
