Jewish Ideas of God

Judaism is the oldest of the world's four biggest monotheistic religions (religions with only one god). It's also the smallest, with only about 12 million followers around the world. Jews believe that there is a single God who not only created the universe, but with whom every Jew can have an individual and personal relationship. Jewish history begins with the covenant established between God and **Abraham** around 1812 BC, during the Bronze Age, in the Middle East. Abraham is considered as the father of the family of Jews.

Islamic Ideas of God

Islam is the **second most popular religion** in the world with over a thousand million followers. It is more often thought of as a complete way of life rather than a religion. Islam began in Arabia and was revealed to humanity by the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him). Those who follow Islam are called Muslims. Muslims believe that there is only one God, called **Allah**. Allah is the name Muslims use for the supreme and unique God, who created and rules everything. The heart of faith for all Muslims is obedience to Allah's will.



Christian Ideas of God

Christians believe that Jesus Christ was the Son of God and that: God sent his Son to earth to save humanity from the consequences of its sins. Jesus was fully human, and experienced this world in the same way as other human beings of his time. Jesus was tortured and gave his life on the Cross (At the Crucifixion) Jesus rose from the dead on the third day after his Crucifixion (the Resurrection) Christians believe that Jesus was the Messiah promised in the Old Testament Christians believe that there is only one God, but that this one God consists of 3 "persons" God the Father - God the Son - The Holy Spirit Christians believe that God made the world.
